

Spotlight on Northern Ireland

Award-winning documentarian Alex Gibney reopens the case of the unresolved Loughinisland massacre in Northern Ireland.

In 1994, six men were gunned down and five wounded in a pub in the small village of Loughinisland while watching Ireland's landmark victory over Italy in the World Cup. Despite a police investigation and subsequent re-openings of the case, no one has ever been charged with the murders.

Alex Gibney reopens the original files and the reports that followed, conducting an exhaustive and fascinating inquiry and uncovering a shocking case of collusion and cover-up. Including interviews with families of the victims, case investigators, and committed journalists, *No Stone Unturned* is a suspenseful and profoundly effective true crime investigation from the producers of *Bobby Sands: 66 Days*.
